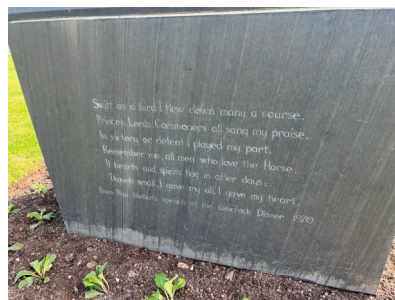

We spent a very happy morning with him and I like to think he felt the same.

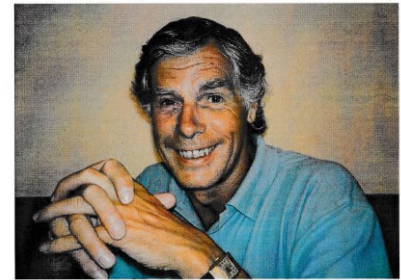

As is the case in most schools the support staff can make or break you. She inherited her first caretaker at Fairstead House who was more than upset when she decided to uproot the orchard for improvements. 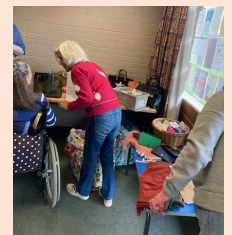
She finally became a School Inspector inspecting and regulating schools throughout the country. She was thrilled that Fairstead House choir performed at the first SAS Christmas Carol Service.

Book Club

Reading difficulties are common for people who have aphasia following stroke, however reading abilities vary between people with aphasia, just as they vary between people without aphasia. Reading difficulties can be very frustrating, especially for those who enjoyed reading before their stroke.

The level of impairment in reading comprehension can vary from no difficulties at all to severe difficulties. Some people may still understand what they're reading, but complex information may be more difficult to read, and the pace of reading may be slower than it was before the stroke.

Some people may find lengthy text difficult, and find short, simple sentences easier to read. A severe impairment could cause the person to have no reading ability at all, or to be able to read only simple, familiar words.

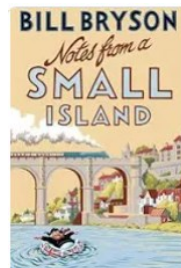
At SAS on a Friday morning, we have an Aphasia Book Club. The club aims to help people with aphasia to read using various 'reading ramps' - these are different strategies that help people access text. These include:

- A large print copy of the text, which the Speech & Language Therapist reads through at the start of the session.
- A bookmark to place under the sentence being read.
- Simple, summary sentences for the members to read.
- Pictures to help members understand the summary sentences.
- Phonological cues - members are given the first sound of a word if they are struggling to read the word.
- Reading together.

We're reading Bill Bryson's *Notes from a Small Island* at the moment, and our members are using the ramps to help them enjoy Bill's amusing view of Britain and its people.

It's a jolly session!!
